## Cívic Responsibility

Linda Duman, parents, and eight students from the school addressed the Linn County Board of Commissioners at their September 13, 2022 meeting and shared their concerns about the mega chicken factory farm. The 38-acre factory chicken farm would raise 4.5 million chickens per year. If approved it will be located a half-mile from Lourdes School and the Lourdes Catholic Church. In March students also attended a public hearing on SB 85 that would set regulatory rules on the placement of large poultry farms. One student testified in person before the Natural Resource committee and one student via Zoom.

### Career Day


